NUMC Board Minutes continued:

#### Treasurer's Report

#### **General Fund**

The balance in the CRB checking account was \$48,385.16, which is \$14,919.89 less than at the end of December 2022. General fund income for the month was \$26,820.66, \$14,834.30 less than the same month last year, and \$46,870.98 less than the previous months revenue. Monthly expenses were greater than last year, including salaries for the Youth Director and musicians, offset by no salary for a Worship Arts Director. We paid apportionments in January. We finished the month and YTD \$15,359.10 in the red.

#### **Physical Plant**

Physical Plant income was mostly from support from the General fund. Expenses were greater than last year for the same month, due to increases in custodial costs. For the month income was more than expense by \$827.39.

#### **Endowment Funds**

These funds now total \$946,923.94 including the amount we owe ourselves, which is \$334,802.54. This is \$34,009.09 more than the first of the year due to market gains.

#### 2023 Budget

Tim informed the board that the 2022 year end budget ended approximately \$30,000 in the red. He also informed the board that the current church budget has no room for any cuts, if we want to keep the current ministries in place. He proposed that we start a stewardship campaign immediately to make up for the deficit from 2022 and to at least break even for 2023. A 10% increase in giving would allow us to break even, while a 15% increase would give us a small cushion to work with. John Stull made a motion to go to the congregation and ask church members for an immediate increase of 13% to 15% in their giving for 2023. Kevin Dahle seconded the motion. **Motion approved.** 

John and Tim will go before the congregation on March 12th and 19th with the appeal. An all congregational letter will also go out in March, concerning the stewardship campaign.

#### Facilities (Kerry Hanson)

Currently the trustees are not planning any major projects on the facilities. Kerry did inform the board there will be a need for a capital campaign, in the future, to repair the parking lots.

#### Set up: nomination task force (Rachel)

Pastor Rachel proposed that those members, who's time on the board will expire in June, should form the nomination task force for new board members. Those members would be Tim Goodwin, Bruce Dalgaard and Jody Friedow. Sara Newberg made a motion to accept the proposal and Allie Lyman seconded. Motion approved.

#### **Dismantling Racism Team (DRT)**

The first week of April is celebrated by the American Public Health Association and others as National Public Health Week. Public health is defined as protecting the health of people and the communities where they live, learn, work, and play. But not everyone in America gets to experience public health equally. Those in the public health field often talk about the social determinants of health, which are non-medical factors that affect how healthy we are, such as:

- Do I live in an area with clean air?
- Do I live in a house that is safe and free of health hazards like mold or lead paint?
- Do I have access to fresh and nutritious food (that I can afford)?
- Can I move around my neighborhood safely?

Each one of these factors manifests differently in neighborhoods across America because of structural racism. Think about practices like redlining, discriminatory lending, over policing and police brutality, decisions about where to build infrastructure and which communities to invest in. For the majority of our country's history, these decisions have been made by white people and white institutions to the detriment of people of color.

As a result of structural racism, there is a long list of disparities in health outcomes between white people and people of color. Here's one example from Minnesota: since 2010, rates of death from asthma have been 1.3 to 3 times higher for Black Minnesotans compared to white Minnesotans, and Native American children and adults in Minnesota are the least likely among all groups to have optimal asthma control. Asthma is influenced by environmental factors like air pollution, proximity to highways, and poor housing quality. - 1. It matters to the legislators. Seeing us in person gives added impact to our words and bolsters their conviction to carry on in the world of justice.
- 2. It matters to those who attend. Sometimes a person might feel like a lone voice, but joining others also bolsters the individual's efforts for justice.
- 3. It matters to those who learn from us after the event and encourages them to also speak out for justice.

### Notes from the Parish Nurse

"Nearly a quarter century ago, the Autism Society launched a nationwide effort to promote autism awareness, inclusion and self-determination for all, and assure that each person with ASD [Autism Spectrum Disorder] is provided the opportunity to achieve the highest possible quality of life." April is *National Autism Awareness Month*. It is a time to promote autism awareness and acceptance. To celebrate, presidential/ congressional declarations are made, online events and activities are available, and in some locations events and activities are planned through affiliates.

"Autism spectrum disorder (ASD) is a complex developmental disability; signs typically appear during early childhood and affect a person's ability to communicate, and interact with others. ASD is defined by a certain set of behaviors and is a 'spectrum condition' that affects individuals differently and to varying degrees." More than 3.5 million Americans live with an autism spectrum disorder. It is the fastest growing developmental disability. The prevalence in the U. S. is estimated at 1 in 68 births.

At each well child visit, care providers should perform a developmental screening. Some behaviors in infants and toddlers warrant further evaluation by a multidisciplinary team. They are listed below.

- Does not coo or babble by 12 months
- Does not point or wave by 12 months
- Does not say single words by 16 months
- Does not say two-word phrases by 24 months
- Has a loss of language or social skill at any age

Signs to look for in slightly older children include:

- Fixation on parts of objects
- Repetitive use of language and/or motor mannerisms (hand-flapping)
- Lack of spontaneous play
- Delay or lack of spoken language
- Little or no eye contact
- · Lack of interest in relationships with peers

Children do not "outgrow" autism, but autism is treatable. There is no single cause of autism, and no single treatment. With increased awareness about the syndrome early diagnosis and intervention can happen, which leads to "significantly improved outcomes."



**AM Speaker: Gina Washburn** – "Entertaining Angels Unawares" issues facing Latino migrants: Gina is a retired attorney having spent her career directing non-profits serving survivors of sexual assault and adults with disabilities and

working as a lobbyist while executive director of the Minnesota County Attorneys Association.

During her 6 years of retirement, Gina has dedicated herself to issues facing our local [Northfield] migrant community having worked on the passage of the City's Municipal ID and now issues facing the residents of Viking Terrace. # **IT Tech Corner**

"Accept my friend request." "Can you do me a favor?" "Hi, I'm Rachel from cardholder services."

Everyone gets these messages by email, text and phone, and there are new ones coming at us all the time. By developing safe practices we can learn to protect ourselves no matter the threat online.

In our first Internet Safety Class last Sunday, I talked about confidence scams and how to stay safe online. Finding out how to distinguish between friendly messages and deceptive tricksters can be a challenge. When I talk to businesses and organizations about marketing I talk about 3 things: your message, your audience, and your distribution channels like newspaper and radio, though I focus primarily on the internet with social media, Google, websites, etc. Good marketing builds trust in the message and the sender, but this is also what bad actors are trying to do.

Scams nowadays aren't like the good old days when a con artist would try to fleece you face to face. Now the scam industry is a highly sophisticated network with call centers, auto dialers, and complex software to track it all. How do they do it so well? The scammers have a lot of our data at their disposal and they go after everyone.

The dark web has to get their databases from somewhere. In the last 15 years there have been significant data breaches at Target, Yahoo, Facebook, and many others. Through these the scammers have our credit cards, purchasing history, browser history, passwords, and more. While this can be very helpful to a scammer, one of the most popular scam types is "call/text/email everyone and see who responds." All of us get these generic messages every day. The most common ones tend to follow this theme: You did something, it is alarming, I can help.

For example: Your bank account has been suspended. Contact us for verification and re-activation.


Or another common one: Your Amazon purchase of \$900 is scheduled for delivery, contact us with questions.

These are designed to create enough alarm and worry on your part that you forget to consider whether the sender is valid or if the message is a trick. We get worried and we want instant resolution (if not sooner!), so of course we want the sender to help us get our account back or refund the purchase we didn't make. There's always a little thin veil in front of the big lie in these scam messages.

These scams are the safest for the scammer because it can be really risky to steal someone's credit card number and use it to buy things in person or online. It takes a lot of time, and there are a lot of systems in place to prevent it and track down the thief. Wouldn't it be a lot safer for the scammer if instead of stealing, they got you to just give them the money or gift cards, and then not report it to the police?

A common one we hear a lot about at the church is a text message that says "Do you have a minute? I need a favor - Rev. Rachel Morey." **Neither Rachel nor any NUMC staff will ever ask for money, gift cards, wire transfers, etc, in this sketchy manner.** If this comes as a text message, look at the sender's phone number. You can always call the church office and ask if the sender's phone number matches Pastor Rachel's. If you receive an email message, look at the sender's email address. Again, call the church office if you are in doubt of communications you receive.

So what can you do? Learning more about the communication programs you use, such as email programs and native phone apps, will help you distinguish between legitimate and scam communications. Learn how to identify the sender's email address, hover over links before clicking on them in emails to see where they will take you, examine attachments to see if the file type makes sense and call the sender on a trusted number before downloading the file. Don't let anyone pressure you into a rash decision. Give yourself time, don't answer right away, and talk to your friends and family about how you should respond to communications from unexpected or unfamiliar sources.




#### Welcome our new bishop, Rev. Lanette Plambeck!

Formative years: Bishop Plambeck grew up in western lowa and spent her first decade unchurched and living in poverty. When her dad married her mom and adopted her, she was introduced to faith and baptized. But it was when she spent two months in the hospital with a severe illness that God showed up and shared God's plan for her life; the very next day, at age 10, she declared that she was going to be a pastor. Eventually, she found her way to United Methodist-related Morningside College (now Morningside University), and started attending a nearby United Methodist Church. "My heart was warmed by that theology," she said, and soon after she became United Methodist.

**Gifts and graces:** Bishop Plambeck describes herself as "unapologetically Wesleyan," empathetic, compassionate, and loyal, and said she clings to her integrity.





**Vision for the church:** "My vision for the church is a body of Christ-followers engaged in serving others and finding wholeness for themselves along the way," Bishop Plambeck said. She holds a deep conviction that church as Jesus saw it—the community of people following his teaching—has the potential and the power to change the world. "Fulfilling that vision begins with local people who know God and learn to love one another – who are committed to serve their local community," she explained.

**Ministry focus:** Developing and deploying leaders has been Bishop Plambeck's passion over her 25 years in pastoral ministry, and she believes this is most successful when there is intentional partnership between laity and clergy. The local church is the most significant location where disciple-making occurs, she said, and "it is where we discover ministry is not the obligation of the licensed or ordained; it is the responsibility, privilege, and joy of all the baptized."

**Human sexuality:** "I desire and will work to remove the restrictive language around human sexuality in the Book of Discipline, relying on the discernment of local churches and clergy to act with grace and faithfulness in their witness and teaching," Bishop Plambeck said. "I believe the North Central Jurisdiction can be a place where clergy are entrusted and empowered to act with theological integrity and social sensitivity as they each determine who they will marry—a place where all people who are gifted and called to be pastors will be able to enter the licensing and ordination process. I trust every church to self-determine how to honor God and love their neighbors in the ways they bear witness and minister within and beyond their walls."

**Fun facts:** The bishop's resume includes two most interesting, non-ministry roles: She is a veteran of the U.S. Army and was deployed to Desert Storm/Desert Shield as a military intelligence analyst from 1989 to 1992. In the Army, she studied Russian language and culture and spent almost a full year at the Defense Language Institute in Monterey, California. She also served as a licensed counselor in family systems and chemical and substance abuse from 1992 to 1997.

**Personal practices and hobbies**: Every day, Bishop Plambeck engages in a daily practice of what she calls "sacred listening" from 4:30 to 7:30 a.m. It is a set-apart time to center, read, meditate, journal, and pray, and the bishop says this is the most disciplined part of her life as well as the most important. In her free time, Bishop Plambeck enjoys finding her way to bookstores, antique shops, or museums. She loves board games, going to brunch with friends, traveling, and baking. And she tries to go on an annual mission trip with a local community of faith. She has one adult daughter who is in her second year at Georgetown Law in Washington, D.C.

Leadership: To stay accountable in her leadership, Bishop Plambeck asks God three questions every day: How may I glorify you? How might I point others to Christ? And (at the end of the day) did I love? Those who enjoy personality assessments might be interested to learn that she is an INTJ on the Myers-Briggs Type Indicator, an Enneagram 3W4, a high D on the DISC Inventory, and her top five StrengthsFinder strengths are ideation, strategic, learner, self-assurance, and achiever. "I am a visionary who is passionate about Jesus, justice, and quality leadership," she said. "I beg permission to assert one inviolate truth: Our deep longing for God and for the vital witness of The United Methodist Church will be fulfilled as by God's grace we stand firm and cling to our deeply rooted spiritual and missional integrity."
