Message from the Pastor

The Itinerant Journey

In the United Methodist Church pastors are itinerant. This means that they are willing to uproot themselves and go where sent on a moment's notice, or a month's notice, or possibly two or three. They are willing to do so, to go where sent, to journey forth, whether an itinerary exists or not.

When writing about "The Itinerant Journey," African American scholar and Methodist preacher Renita Weems has this to say:

"Normally, someone who just takes off on a journey with no earthly idea where she is going is called a vagabond, a bum, a Gypsy. But I am called a Reverend."

When District Superintendent Michelle Hargrave asked me to consider meeting with the Leadership Team at the United Methodist Church of Northfield, I nodded, I sighed. I had an earthly idea as to where I was going. I didn't need Google Maps to find my way.

Minnesota is a big state, and there are many places that I have not traversed. Yet there are two areas I know relatively well – the Twin Cities – where I lived and worked for over half of my adult life – and southeastern Minnesota, where I grew up, where three of my four siblings live, and where I have served in ministry for five years.

As I begin this itinerate journey with you, one might ask, "So, what is your itinerary?"

Entering this ministry and mission field – as all pastors are appointed not only to a congregation, but also to the community in which the congregation resides – my itinerary is three-fold:

- 1. to learn your names and hear your stories;
- 2. to discern where God's Spirit is already at work in your midst because God's Spirit is already at work in your midst; and
- 3. to collaborate with you to follow God's leading to be a vibrant Methodist presence in this place (inside and outside our doors).

Yet it is not my itinerary – or even yours – that we follow. It is God's, and God takes us in directions we may never imagine.

I look forward to this journey with you and getting to know each and every one of you by name.

Treasurer's Report for May and June 2024

General Fund

The Community Resource Bank checking account balance at the end of May was \$31,481.13 and at the end of June it was \$47,914.10. June's balance is \$118.83 more than the beginning of the year balance of \$47,795.27; this is intentional to maintain a reserve to help cover expenses over the summer months. Due to cash flow, May and June apportionments have not been paid. Monthly apportionments are \$4,645.58.

Combined Offering Income for May and June was \$40,763.32. Year to date (YTD) Actual Offering Income was \$148,960.96 which is \$33,210.00 less than YTD Last Year and \$51,039.04 less than a straight-line YTD Budget of \$200,000.00. Combined General Fund Income Total for May and June was \$41,327.19. Other Income Totals of \$563.87 came from Interest Income, Super Wednesday Meal Proceeds and Regular Facility Usage. General Fund YTD Actual Income was \$162,375.75 which is \$43,801.35 less than YTD Last Year and \$46,499.31 less than a straight-line YTD Budget of \$208,875.06.

As was noted in the April Treasurer's Report, several giving units have informed the church office that they are changing from giving monthly to giving at the end of the year based on advice from their financial planners. Thus, monthly EFT giving has dropped from about \$7,000 to \$5,000. Weekly offering amounts have also decreased since more people are just doing quarterly or end of year contributions. This change in giving patterns makes it difficult to manage cash flow.

Monthly Expense Totals for May and June were \$76,127.30. YTD Actual Expense Totals were \$204,995.77 which is \$31,161.66 less than YTD Last Year but \$26,942.21 more than a straight-line YTD Budget of \$178,053.56. YTD we are \$42,620.02 in the red, compared to \$30,821.50 we budgeted to be in the black.

Physical Plant

Combined Support from General Fund income for May and June was \$32,778.32. YTD Actual Income was \$100,442.27 and was made up of \$66,913.60 from General Fund Support for Physical Plant, \$3,875.00 from continuing contributions to the last Building Campaign, and a total of \$33,528.67 from Building Fund made up of an Annual Interest Income disbursement of \$21,928.67 and a \$11,600.00 disbursement for the increase in Gap Insurance. YTD Actual Expenses were \$80,880.17 which leaves a positive balance of \$23,437.10.

Endowment Funds

At the end of December 2023 these funds totaled \$941,047.78 which includes \$334,802.54 that we owe ourselves. The YTD Balance at the end of June was \$912,494.51. A 6% disbursement, a total \$36,602.88, on the balance in the accounts as of the April 30th statement, was taken in May. An additional disbursement of \$11,600 from the Building Fund was also taken in May to cover the unexpected fourfold increase in gap insurance. Considering disbursements, the combined Endowment Funds show a gain of \$19,649.61 during the first six months of 2024.

News and prayers from the Shepherd Society in Bethlehem (The West Bank):

The situation in Gaza is beyond human comprehension, and we now find that we cannot ignore the dire realities unfolding on the West Bank, (where our NUMC Bethlehem family lives). As of June 4, 508 Palestinians have been killed, including 124 children. Israeli authorities have demolished, confiscated, or forced the owners to demolish 904 Palestinian structures, of which 39 percent (350 structures) were inhabited homes. As a result, 2,038 people, including 890 children, were displaced (source: OCHA). Please pray for the people and activities of the Shepherd Society, as they face the great difficulties around them. Pray for divine intervention in every step they make in such critical circumstances.

What can you make with our olive oil available in the church office?

Tabouli [tah-BOO-lee] (Middle Eastern Wheat and Parsley Salad)

Soak several hours:

1 c. cracked wheat/bulgur in 3 c. boiling water, then drain thoroughly in large sieve.

Meanwhile mix:

1 1/2 c. fresh parsley, finely chopped

1 1/4 t. salt

1/2 c. fresh mint, finely chopped

1/4 t. pepper

1/2 c. onions (preferably green

onions), minced

1/4 c. oil (preferably olive)
1 small cucumber, chopped

1/4 c. lemon juice

3 firm tomatoes, chopped

Toss all ingredients together, cover and chill. Serve with romaine lettuce.

Traditionally each person breaks the lettuce into small pieces, using them as utensils for eating Tabouli. This salad may be prepared a day in advance and refrigerated, but do not add the lemon juice until just before serving - from Extending The Table cookbook.



IT Tech Corner

Back it up!

The importance of having a backup of electronic data cannot be overstated. You don't need it until you need it, but when you need it, boy, you better have it.

I tell my boys that the first thing we need to do when they start playing a new app game or using a new program to design a Minecraft mod is to learn how to save their progress. There's nothing worse than seeing the pain in someone's eyes or hearing their mournful cries at the loss of their new digital creation. There's been a time or two when I've discovered a new cool set of keystrokes that deleted my PHP or CSS file with no recovery and I had to go into my backups to at last avoid starting from scratch.

Every device these days offers ways to make a backup, either locally or to the cloud. While backing up to a cloud may produce anxiety, it is generally a safe thing to do and will save you a lot of time the next time you get a new device or have to perform a factory reset on your phone (not based on a true story, from Saturday.) When you run a backup on your phone, you can choose which things to backup. While you probably are thinking of backing up your address book, photos, documents, etc, I recommend including app configurations in your backup of choice. Having your passwords written down somewhere is also a solid idea.

Notes from the Parish Nurse

The beautiful days of summer remind us that the earth is full of the goodness of the Lord. It is a wonderful time to share outdoor activities with family and friends. As we enjoy these gifts from God we also need to be aware of ways to protect ourselves from some of summer's unpleasant pests.

This is the time to learn about ticks, what their bites can cause, and preventive steps to avoid their bites. Ticks are small insects that fasten themselves to humans and to animals. Although a tick's bite is relatively painless, the real dangers are the bacteria and other organisms that the tick may carry. Of greatest concern is the deer (blacklegged) tick which can spread Lyme disease and the related disease, human granulocytic anaplasmosis (HGA).



A deer tick, which is only about the size of a sesame seed, is difficult to see. Deer tick nymphs are not much larger than the period at the end of a sentence, so they are easily overlooked. Ticks and nymphs must feed for 24 hours or more to transmit the bacteria which causes Lyme disease or HGA.

It is important to take precautions to avoid tick bites. First, avoid wooded bushy areas with high grass and leaf litter. If walking in those areas, stay in the center of the trails. Second, wear light-colored clothing (so it is easier to detect ticks), long sleeves, long pants tucked into your socks, and boots or shoes. Third apply tick repellent. Repellent containing 20-30% DEET can be applied to one's skin and clothing and will last several hours. Pre-treat boots, pants, socks, and even tents with 0.5% permethrin. It needs to be applied several hours before use so it can dry thoroughly. It will continue to give protection even after clothing has been washed several times. And finally, check often for ticks and make a "full-body tick-check" at the end of the day. Susceptible areas where ticks might hide are in arm pits, around ears, inside "belly buttons", behind knees, in the groin area, around the waist, and especially in the hair. Be sure to check children and pets for ticks too.





To remove a tick, grasp it close to your skin with a tweezer and pull upward with a steady even pressure until it releases its hold. Do not crush the tick's body or handle it with bare fingers to minimize bacteria exposure. Dip the tick in alcohol and place it in a zip lock baggy in case it needs to be identified. Then wash the bite area thoroughly with soap and water. If you are unable to remove the entire tick or if a tick has been attached for more than 24 hours see your health care provider.

Lyme disease and HGA are not uncommon diseases. Each year in the United States, the CDC reports over 30,000 cases of Lyme disease and around 6,000 cases of HGA. These two diseases are often difficult to diagnose though because the symptoms are non-specific. A diagnosis is made by health history, symptoms, physical exam, and blood tests, including a bacterial culture of the blood. Symptoms of Lyme disease include: a red "bull's eye" skin rash at the site of the bite, flu-like fever and chills, headache, muscle fatigue, and joint pain. For HGA most people experience severe headaches, fever over 102 degrees, and general malaise with muscle aches, chills, and shaking. Symptoms can occur as early as three days to as late as 30 days after a bite, but typically they begin in 7-14 days. Left untreated, the diseases can lead to arthritis, respiratory illnesses, and heart abnormalities. Treatment is usually with a common antibiotic such as doxycycline or amoxicillin.

Minnesota Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church Wednesday, May 29th to Thursday, May 30th, 2024

The 170th session of the Minnesota Annual Conference was a two-day meeting. The Conference was held in the Doubletree Hotel in Bloomington, MN. This year's theme was Jesus Redeemer.

The Annual Conference opened with worship which culminated with Bishop Lanette Plambeck's Episcopal Address: Minding the Gap.

This was our first Annual Conference after the completion of the season of UMC church disaffiliation that had been initiated as a result of the 2019 special session of the General Conference. The 2019 General Conference created a Disaffiliation Agreement that spelled out a process by which the UMC churches worldwide could disaffiliate from the United Methodist Church. The agreement expired December 31, 2023.

In Minnesota 8% of UMC churches disaffiliated over a two-year period. These churches represented 4% of UMC church members in Minnesota.

The Minnesota UMC remains a church conference of 330 churches with 50,270 members who are active in making disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. As always, the UMC Annual Conference has always had an active new start congregation program.

This year's MN UMC Annual Conference also followed the 2024 General Conference which was attended by delegates representing the worldwide UMC Annual Conferences whose churches stayed committed to the UMC.

Pastor Rachel has reported to us the legislation of the 2024 General Conference through e-mails and an Adult Forum in May. The Minnesota UMC Annual Conference will act upon this General Conference's legislation during the 2025 MN UMC Annual Conference.

MN Annual Conference Legislation

The full text of each of these pieces of legislation is available from our church office.

The MN Annual conference voted to reorganize the number of conference districts from five to four. The four districts will have as its common point the Twin Cities metropolitan area. The new name of our district (SE quarter of MN) is River Bluffs. Our District Superintendent is Rev. Michelle Hargrave.

The Annual Conference voted to create a Board of Lay Ministry. It will be led by an elected Conference Lay Leader and 2 Co-Lay Leaders.

The Annual Conference passed (383 yes, 3 no) a resolution to engage MN UMC in alleviating hate crimes and hate speech. The resolution includes specific actions that the Annual Conference calls on its congregations to commit to going forward.

The Annual Conference passed (187 yes, 175 no) a resolution calling the current domination over Palestinians by the Israeli government an apartheid system. Further, it called such an apartheid system a crime against humanity. It calls on the US government to condition future funding to Israel upon its willingness to dismantle this apartheid system.

There was much discussion for and against this resolution as reflected in the vote. We were not of one mind on this issue. Stay tuned.

We adopted the 2025 MN Annual Conference Apportioned Budget. The budget adopted is \$5,291,979. This budget is 9.6% less than the amount of our 2024 apportioned budget. This budget amount is the lowest since 2013.

Chasing Fireflies

Do you ever look out your window on a warm summer evening and see tiny flashes of light start to flicker in your yard? At first there are just a few, but soon hundreds of blinking lights are floating around. The fireflies have come out for the evening. It's magical. I have always loved watching fireflies or lightning bugs as we called them as kids. I can remember as a kid we'd chase them, trying to catch them in a net then put them in a jar with vent holes in the cover. We'd watch them light up as we sat in the dark with our jar of "lightning bugs" thinking it was the coolest thing ever and then after a while we'd set them free again. A great childhood memory of something so simple and yet so magical. I still love to sit in my backyard and watch the fireflies put on a good display. Lately, my backyard has been full of them. Even my dog Fletcher loves to chase fireflies and try to catch them. I could not figure out one night what he was doing when he would run a little ways and then bite at the air around him. Finally I noticed he was biting at the light from a firefly. It made me laugh and sort of feel like I was in a Disney movie or something. Fireflies just seem very magical to me. They bring back lots of childhood memories of playing in the yard on a summer night with the neighbor kids.



The firefly or lightning bug, is a fascinating creature. Fireflies are found on every continent except Antartica. They live throughout the United States and are most commonly seen on hot summer evenings in parks, meadows, gardens and wooded areas. It is estimated that there are over 2,000 species of firefly worldwide with approximately 146 species in North America with more species being discovered all the time. None of these species are actually flies however, they are beetles.



Fireflies are surprisingly very important to the environment. Their larvae feed on garden pests, like slugs, snails, and grubs, and keep flower and vegetable beds naturally pest-free. Adult fireflies also

eat pollen and nectar and are very efficient pollinators benefiting many flowering plants. They have a very short lifespan. Adult fireflies only live for about a month. Its primary goal is to find a mate and reproduce so it can start the next cycle of fireflies. One reason fireflies glow is to attract a mate. Each firefly species has its own specific light pattern so that males and females of the same species will recognize each other and "talk" to each other by using a sequence of blinking lights. Another reason they glow is to avoid predators. Fireflies have a nasty-tasting chemical in them and once a predator gets a mouthful it quickly learns to associate the firefly's glow with this bad taste. Except for my dog Fletcher, he hasn't figured that out yet, he continues to try to catch them in his mouth.



While fireflies are cherished in many areas their population is also declining. Fewer and fewer are seen each year. Although it is estimated that one in three species of fireflies may be at risk of extinction, fireflies receive little conservation attention. Fireflies face a variety of threats, from habitat loss, light pollution, pesticide use, climate change, poor water quality and invasive species. What can we do to help the firefly population? Turn out your outside lights at night! Lights at night confuse fireflies and interfere with their attempts to signal and communicate with each other. Provide habitat! Set aside a part of your yard or garden where you can let things get a little "wild" with native grasses and wildflowers. You can also place bags of wet leaf compost in a shady spot which will attract snails, slugs and other insects which is food for firefly larvae. Avoid pesticides! Pesticides kill fireflies and degrade their habitat.

Who knew that a firefly was more than just a fun bug we chased as kids? Firefies are another one of God's amazing creations in nature. This tiny creature provides an important role to our environment along with the added bonus of some great childhood memories. We need to be good stewards of nature and all of its creatures. Just like bees, we need to protect the fireflies. There's something very mesmerizing about watching a good firefly display. Fireflies bring me a feeling of nostalgia, of carefree times as a kid. The simple joy of chasing a magic light up bug. I hope you have the opportunity this summer to sit in the quiet darkness of nature and enjoy a magical firefly display that brings back childhood memories for you as well. – Sandy Vesledahl, Office Administrator


