Treasurers Report for March and April 2025

General Fund

The CRB checking account balance at the end of February was \$41,681.64. The end of March balance was \$39,223.83 which then decreased to \$37,921.76 at the end of April. Only January and February apportionments of \$4,106.50 each have been paid.

Respective Monthly Offering Income for March and April was \$23,259.91 and \$30,191.66. YTD Actual Offering Income was \$106,395.02; \$1,802.62 less than YTD Last Year and \$1,938.34 less than YTD Budget of \$108,333.36. Other Income Totals from March and April of \$2,724.31 and \$3,343,47 came from Interest Income, Super Wednesday Meal Proceeds and Regular Facility Usage. Thus, General Fund Income Totals for March and April were \$25,984.22 and \$33,626.13. General Fund YTD Actual Income was \$116,579.69; \$4,468.87 less than YTD Last Year, and \$3,273.67 less than the YTD Budget of \$119,853.36.

Monthly Expenses for March and April were \$29,547.03 and \$36,373.65. YTD Actual Expense Totals were \$141,919.69; \$11,366.58 less than the YTD Budget of \$153,286.27. YTD expenses exceed income by \$25,340.00 which is \$8,092.91 less than was budgeted for the end of April 2025.

Physical Plant

Monthly income (Support from General Fund) for March and April was \$9,058.09 and \$7,774.00. In February \$18,000 was withdrawn from the Building Maintenance Endowment Fund to pay planned expenses associated with the kitchen, dining room and main floor bathroom cabinet upgrades at the parsonage. YTD Actual Income was \$61,530.02; \$41,405.02 from General Fund Support for Physical Plant, \$2,125.00 from continuing contributions to the Building Fund, and \$18,000.00 from the Building Maintenance Endowment. YTD Actual Expenses were \$61,006.21 which leaves a positive balance of \$523.81.

Endowment Funds

At the end of December, the total value of the four endowment funds was \$742,577.34. In February \$199,046.17 from the Jim Finholt Estate was deposited into the Undesignated Endowment Fund and \$18,000 was withdrawn from the Building Maintenance Endowment Fund to pay for the estimated costs of the parsonage kitchen cabinet remodel. Thus, the YTD Balance at the end of April (including market value fluctuations) was \$923,289.66 which shows a YTD gain of \$180,712.32.

"Learn to do good; seek justice, rescue the oppressed, defend the orphan, plead for the widow."

ISAIAH is a vehicle for congregations, clergy, and people of faith to act collectively and powerfully towards racial and economic equity in the state of Minnesota. Isaiah works to create a Minnesota that ensures the conditions in which all Minnesotans can be healthy. By uniting local congregations in a large regional organization, ISAIAH strengthens the ability of people of faith to address both local and regional issues.

We are in unprecedented times as a county, state, and community. Isaiah leaders are organizing volunteers to meet with local and county officials to urge them to stand against the proposed efforts cutting Medicaid, Social Security, food assistance, and early childhood education and childcare, and, in turn, to contact their state and national representative to vote against these measures. We know that these proposed cuts further harm working families already struggling to get by. Hospitals and long term healthcare facilities are worried that they may not be able to continue. Your voice matters. Contact your state representatives and ask that they:

- Oppose cuts to Social Security, Medicaid, CHIP, SNAP, HeadStart and Childcare Funding
- Reject tax cuts that would defund essential programs working people in our communities depend

You might want to know...

PRIDE stands for Professionalism, Respect, Integrity, Diversity and Excellence.

PRIDE calls for greater unity, visibility, and equality for the LGBTQ+ community.

PRIDE in the Park is part of **PRIDE Month**, an annual commemoration during the month of June that recognizes those who identify as LGBTQ+ community members, as well as their supporters and allies. **PRIDE Month** is dedicated to these communities in U.S. cities and in countries throughout the world.

Events held during **PRIDE Month** recognize the impact of LGBTQ+ people have had in the world. According to GLAAD (the Gay and Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation), this annual recognition provides "an opportunity for the community to come together, take stock and recognize the advances and setbacks made in the past year. It is also a chance for the community to come together and celebrate in a festive, affirming atmosphere."

The first **PRIDE** marches were held in New York, Los Angeles and Chicago on June 28, 1970, to commemorate the New York City Stonewall Uprising, which had occurred at the end of June the year before. Thousands of LGBTQ+ people gathered to commemorate Stonewall and demonstrate for equal rights. Since then, three U.S. presidents have officially recognized the month: Bill Clinton in 1999, Barack Obama in 2009, and Joe Biden in 2021.

The first Northfield **PRIDE** in the Park celebration was held in June of 2021. NUMC, which became a Reconciling Congregation in August of 2019, was there, represented by members of our Reconciling Ministries Team, and has been each year since.

Please join in the celebration this year. Our active engagement in PRIDE events is an important - and fun! - step we can take, individually and together, toward living into our congregation's commitment to becoming truly reconciling. On May 8, 2025 in the Catholic Church, Cardinal Robert Prevost was elected as the first US-born pontiff Thursday and will be known as Pope Leo XIV. Before being elected to this role, Pope Leo XIV spent most of his ministry in Peru, one of the largest host countries in Latin America for refugees. His papal name, Leo, is widely associated with the social justice legacy of Pope Leo XIII. He is expected to continue much of Pope Francis's reforms in the Catholic Church.

May his papacy reflect the compassion of Christ, the justice of your prophets, and the courage of those who walk with the marginalized. Remembering the Nakba event:

On Saturday, May 10, about 50-60 people gathered at Bridge Square to learn of the Palestinian catastrophe on May 15,1948 when over 400 Palestinian villages were depopulated and razed. 750,000 displaced people have not been allowed to return. This ethnic cleansing of the Palestinians from their homes continues today. During the event on May 10, the names of these villages were read and as each name was read, a bell was rung, and those attending were invited to participate in placing a small flag on a large map on the location of one of the villages. This year was the 12th year for this remembrance ceremony, where there has always been Methodist involvement. One first time attendee commented, "The Nakba event was meaningful and inspiring. MICAH'S advocacy work aligns with the UMC REVISED SOCIAL PRINCIPLES

The Social Principles as adopted by General Conference Charlotte, 2024, will officially take effect January 1, 2025. Cokesbury Publishing, the United Methodist publishing house will print the updated, official UMC Social Principles booklet in June 2025.

UMC Revised Social Principles: The Political Community

A. Church and Governments

We reject governmental use of threats, extortion, unlawful detentions, extrajudicial killings, and other forms of coercion to silence political opponents and those objecting to unlawful or immoral government policies and practices. In keeping with international laws and ordinances, we vehemently protest the use of torture, slavery, genocide, war crimes, crimes against humanity, and crimes of aggression by any government and call for the strictest international sanctions to be imposed in such cases.

While we do not believe churches should affiliate with particular political parties, we do encourage churches to speak out boldly on social issues from a Gospel perspective. We further believe churches have a right and a responsibility to educate and equip their members to be effective advocates for justice in the wider world.

IT Tech Corner By Jesse Steed

The value of collaboration online

As a team leader, I want to make it easy for my team members to participate in the work of my committee, whether it's MICAH, streamdesk, Rotary, whatever. In real estate, we have a saying, "The best system is the one you use!" The systems and tools that help me collaborate with my team

often include documents, calendars, email lists, presentations, graphic design work, videos - just all kinds of things that are easy to use and easy to lose. Here are my basic rules to enhance the former and minimize the latter.

Tag everything. If you create something digitally, chances are there are ways to assign keywords, categories, tags of some kind. You can tag people, ministries, events, etc. The more tags you give something, the more breadcrumbs you are dropping to find your way back to it. There's nothing more frustrating than looking all over digital tarnation trying to find a document or information instead of working on the task itself.

Cross pollinate. Provide direct links to content in documents, calendar invites, emails.

No attachments. Stop attaching documents to email messages. When you attach it, you are giving a copy of the original. Instead, provide a link to the original. This is very helpful especially when you are requesting feedback or collaboration because people can comment on or edit the original, saving time for everyone. It also reduces the email storage taken up by attachments, which adds up and pushes people past the 15GB limit common in free providers like Gmail, prompting people to pay Google for extra storage or make decisions on which family photos to delete instead of deleting all the email attachments.

However you collaborate with others, it is important to consider how to collectively save time and energy to put forward your best effort for your cause. The more you can do in cloud-based environments, the easier it will be to pass the baton to the next team leader and incorporate new members into your group.

Notes from the Parish Nurse

June is Dementia and Brain Awareness Month. The incidence of dementia is increasing as our population ages. There are many different type of dementia, the most common being Alzheimer's disease. While researchers aren't sure what causes Alzheimer's, they suspect that plaques and "bundles" in the brain might be responsible. The Alzheimer's Association recommends the following to help promote brain health and possibly prevent dementia. Though it hasn't been proven that these strategies help, some research indicates they may reduce the risk of cognitive decline.



- **Break a sweat**. Engage in regular cardiovascular exercise that elevates your heart rate and increases blood flow to your brain and body.
- **Don't ignore hearing loss!** There is a growing body of evidence that shows a strong relationship between hearing loss and dementia, in that better hearing seems to delay cognitive decline.
- **Hit the books.** Formal education in any stage of life seems to help reduce the risk of dementia. Take a class at a college, community center, or online.
- **Stop smoking.** Quitting smoking can reduce the risk of cognitive decline to levels comparable to those who have not smoked.
- **Follow your heart.** Evidence shows that risk factors for cardiovascular disease and stroke—obesity, high blood pressure, and diabetes—negatively impact cognitive health. Take care of your heart, and your brain might follow.
- **Heads up!** Help prevent brain injury by wearing a seat belt when in a vehicle, using a helmet when playing contact sports or riding a bike, and preventing falls.
- Fuel up! Eat a healthy and balanced diet that is lower in fat and higher in vegetables and fruits.
- Catch some ZZZs. Not getting enough sleep due to conditions like insomnia or sleep apnea may result in problems with memory and thinking. Consult your care provider if you are frequently having problems getting between 6-8 hours of sleep per night.
- Take care of your mental health. Seek medical treatment if you have symptoms of depression, anxiety, or other mental health concerns. Also, try to manage stress.
- Buddy up. Staying socially engaged may support brain health. Pursue social activities that are meaningful to you.
- **Stump yourself.** Challenge and activate your mind. Build a piece of furniture, complete a jigsaw puzzle, do something artistic, or play games that make you think strategically.

Those of us living in colder winter weather states cherish the summer months when there are so many fun outdoor activities such as playing sports, enjoying the weather, swimming, bike riding, and so much more. Here are some tips to remember, to ensure a safe summer full of good memories.

- Use sunscreen and reapply every 2-3 hours. This is important for children AND adults. 90% of skin cancer is caused by the UV rays of the sun, so avoid the outdoor peak hours of 10 AM to 4 PM. Wear sunscreen with a sun protection factor (SPF) of at least 30, stay in the shade when possible, and wear a hat.
- Wear UV-protective sunglasses. Exposure to the sun's rays is a big factor in the formation of cataracts.
- Wear a bike helmet!! Yes, even adults! They can save lives and prevent serious head injuries by 60%.
- **Protect yourself from insect bites.** Wear insect repellant when outside, especially at dawn and dusk. Also, wear long sleeves and long pants to protect against bites from mosquitoes and ticks that can carry diseases.
- **Practice good water safety!!** Never swim alone, watch carefully children who are swimming, and wear a PFD (personal flotation device/life jacket) when boating.
- Have a severe weather plan at home! A severe weather "kit" should contain batteries, first aid supplies, snacks, bottled water, flashlights, a battery operated radio or NOAA radio, and your cell phone. Talk over a severe weather plan with family members so all are prepared for an emergency.
