Message from the Pastor

Remembering and Renewing

November is a month of remembering. On All Saints Sunday, we name aloud those who have gone before us—saints of our families, friends, and congregation—whose faith helped shape our own. We light candles for them and lift up the quiet saints whose light still flickers in our hearts.

Each year, this moment touches me deeply. It reminds me that the Church universal—and this congregation in particular—was not built in a day or by one generation. It was built, and continues to be built, by faithful people who prayed, worshiped, served, gave, and imagined a future they could not yet see. Their courage and generosity are the shoulders on which we stand.

This fall, we continue the work of discernment following our 170th-anniversary celebration last July—a milestone that invited both gratitude and honesty. We gave thanks for the legacy of those who have led and loved this congregation, even as we acknowledged the complexity of our past. We lifted up our land acknowledgment, which we'll share again on the Sunday before Thanksgiving, remembering that we live and serve on the homelands of the Dakota Nation. This practice reminds us that history is layered—and that faith calls us to repair and restore, as well as to remember and rejoice.

Our Leadership Board is currently engaging in a visioning touchpoint, listening for how God is calling us forward. We are asking three guiding questions:

Where have we been? Where are we now?

How do we position ourselves for future possibilities?

These are not just organizational questions—they are spiritual ones. They call us to look with integrity and hope at the gifts we carry, the challenges we face, and the future God imagines for us.

In this season of gratitude and vision, I'm also mindful of our call to care for creation—the land, water, and creatures that surround and sustain us. Creation care is not only an environmental issue; it's a spiritual one. To love God and neighbor is to love this good earth and to live in ways that nurture life for generations yet to come.

As we remember the saints and dream new dreams, I'm reminded of words from Jan Richardson:

"What the departed leave behind is more than memory; it is the enduring echo of love that calls us to live as those who remember what it means to be alive."

May this November be a season of remembering and renewing—of gratitude for the saints who shaped our path, and courage to follow where the Spirit is leading next. Look for updates from the Leadership Board in the coming month as we continue discerning the next faithful steps of our shared ministry.

Treasurer's Report for September 2025

General Fund

The CRB checking account balance at the end of September was \$42,302.10 compared to the August balance of \$32,416.75; shows an increase of \$9,885.35 due to a September withdrawal of \$25,889.50 from endowment funds. Apportionments have only been paid through June due to a low balance in the checkbook; total owed for July, August and September is \$12,319.50.

Monthly Offering Income for September was \$13,948.00. YTD Actual Offering Income was \$211,753.79 which is \$31,996.62 less than YTD Budget of \$243,750.01. Other Income Totals of \$2,163.68 for September came from Interest Income, Super Wednesday Meal Proceeds and Regular Facility Usage. General Fund Income Total for September was \$16,111.68. Thus, General Fund YTD Actual Income was \$227,548.20; \$42,121.81 less than the YTD Budget of \$269,670.01.

Monthly Expenses for September totaled \$29,462.40. YTD Actual Expense Totals were \$314,748.56; \$30,145.97 less than the YTD Budget of \$344,894.52. YTD expenses exceed income by \$87,200.36 which is \$11,975.85 more than the YTD Budget shortfall of \$75,224.51.

Physical Plant

Monthly income (Support from General Fund) for September was \$8,486.390. YTD Actual Income was \$156,369.75; \$101,950.78 from General Fund Support for Physical Plant, \$4,220.00 from continuing contributions to the Building Fund, \$981.79 from Other Building Contributions, and \$49,217.18 from the Building Maintenance Endowment fund.

YTD Actual Expenses were \$128,267.73 which leaves a positive balance of \$28,102.02. Significant facility insurance payments totaling \$16,606.51 were paid in June; \$11,399.08 to Lamb Insurance Services for annual excess wind and hail coverage and \$5,207.43 to Church Mutual for initial 3 months of church and parsonage coverage. The material and outside labor cost of the cabinet upgrades to the parsonage kitchen, dining room and main floor bathroom during February and March totaled \$15,326.80; donated labor totaled 300 hours.

Endowment Funds

At the beginning of January 2025, the total value of the four endowment funds was \$742,577.34. In February \$199,046.17 from the Jim Finholt Estate was deposited into the Undesignated Fund. In February \$18,000 was withdrawn from the Building Maintenance Fund to help pay planned expenses associated with the kitchen, dining room and main floor bathroom cabinet upgrades at the parsonage. In May \$11,000.00 was withdrawn from the Building Maintenance Fund to help pay for annual gap (excess wind and hail) insurance. In May, 3% of the April balances in the Sather Mission, Building Maintenance and Undesignated Funds, a total of \$24,885.79, was withdrawn. In September, 3% of the August balances in the Sather Mission, Building Maintenance and Undesignated Funds, a total of \$25,889.50 was also withdrawn. The YTD Balance at the end of September (including market value fluctuations, fees and withdrawals) was \$955,797.00 which shows a monthly loss of \$8,416.88 and a YTD gain of \$213,219.66.

Mission Outreach Team

As we move into a season of gratitude and giving, we're delighted to share that our Mission Outreach Team has relaunched.

This team—Lynn Gryc, Dorothy Orde, Mary Twitchell, and possibly you—will help us lift up both local and global mission efforts, especially those connected to the wider United Methodist connection.

Through their leadership, we'll continue to explore how our generosity and service can make a difference in the lives of others—across the street and around the world.

Enter your 10-digit GivePlus Text number and the amount you wish donate, then press send.




2. Register

11/9: Showing Up for Palestine Guest: Joan Deming, "Hope is Something We Do" - Sermon

Bio: Joan Deming is a retired United Methodist Pastor whose career included local church ministry in Wisconsin and nonprofit work on behalf of Palestinian Christian organizations in the West Bank and Israel. Since 2009 she has led many "Living Stones" Pilgrimages to Israel/Palestine to visit holy sites and hear stories from Palestinian and Israeli Peacemakers. She has traveled to the West Bank and Israel four times in the last year and a half to volunteer as part of a protective international presence on the Tent of Nations Farm southwest of Bethlehem. In both worship and a Forum on November 9th, she will share from her experiences at the Tent of Nations as well as recent experiences with friends in Bethlehem and in the Galilee region of northern Israel.

11/16: Insights into Palestine-Israel Guests: Bob Goonin & Ashraf Ashkar,

Description: The presentation will include the historical context and connection to current events, what it is like to live under occupation, and introduction to the boycott, divestment, sanctions (BDS) movement. To be followed by Q&A.

Bios: Ashraf Ashkar was born and raised in Palestine. While living under the Israeli military occupation, he worked with local and international agencies on water rights and access.
