Message from the Pastor

Seeking: Honest Questions for Deeper Faith

On January 24, after the death of Alex Petri, many in our Northfield community gathered for an interfaith vigil. We came carrying shock, grief, and questions. We lit candles. We stood shoulder to shoulder. We were reminded that even in uncertainty, we do not stand alone.

That evening felt like holy ground — not because we had answers, but because we showed up.

In many ways, that is what Lent invites us to do.

This year, our congregation will journey with A Sanctified Art's resource *Seeking: Honest Questions for Deeper Faith*. Lent is not a season of easy certainty. It is a season of courage and honesty. A season for slowing down. A season for bringing our real questions before God.

Scripture is full of seekers — people who wrestle, wonder, doubt, hope, and ask again. And God meets them, again and again, not with quick solutions, but with presence.

In a town like Northfield — where students wrestle with big ideas, where neighbors gather in times of loss, where faith and public life intersect — seeking feels like faithful work. We see it when neighbors help neighbors through the Community Action Center. We see it in the generosity of the MN FoodShare March Campaign, when our wider community joins together to stock and support local food shelves. Seeking is not only about reflection; it is about participation. It is about showing up for one another.

Lent gives us space for reflection and lament. It invites us to ask:

What is shaping my faith right now?
Where is God in the midst of grief or change?
What needs tending in my own heart?
How might God be calling me to serve?

The Lenten journey ultimately leads us toward Holy Week — toward the cross, toward sorrow, toward love that does not turn away from suffering — and then, in God's time, toward resurrection.

But we do not rush there.

We seek. We serve. We walk together.

As we move through these weeks, may we be a church that is brave in our questions, generous in our compassion, and steady in hope — trusting that the God who meets us in candlelight also meets us in wilderness and in dawn.



Notes from the Parish Nurse



Honoring Choices Minnesota is an initiative that encourages individuals to plan for their advance care. “The process of advance care planning (ACP) involves conversations throughout life about your values, beliefs, and goals for future health care. ACP conversations focus on your health care goals and what is important to you.” This process makes sure that your wishes will be known at a time when you may not be able to make your own medical decisions or cannot communicate your health care choices, such as after an accident, worsening of an illness, or sudden illness. It is best to make these decisions when you are able to make your own choices and thus give yourself peace of mind. Regularly revisit your decisions and plans because as one gets older, health status and goals, values, and priorities might change.

“Documenting your wishes in a Health Care Directive is important. The document outlines your values and priorities for future medical treatment and can identify your health care agent. A Health Care Directive limits confusion and helps everyone prepare for the unexpected.” Choosing a health care agent is a vital step in advance care planning. Your health care agent will be the person who speaks for you and makes decisions for you if you are unable to do so yourself. Important considerations in choosing this person include:

- Do you trust this person to make tough decisions?
- Will the person honor your wishes even though he/she doesn’t agree with them?
- Can this person make important decisions in stressful situations?
- Can this person stand firm on your wishes even though family members disagree?

To complete a Health Care Directive, it is important to identify spiritual and personal beliefs that might influence your decisions on treatment. Then a written plan can be made that outlines your future medical treatment. Topics covered are often related to decisions about cardiopulmonary resuscitation, help with breathing, artificial hydration and nutrition, comfort care, dialysis, and hospice care. In Minnesota, you must have two adults or a notary public witness your signature on your directive. Keep your original Health Care Directive in a safe place in your home. Give copies to your health care agent, other family members, your primary care physician, and possibly to your local hospital.

Many people have strong feelings about what they want or don’t want to happen if they become hospitalized or incapacitated. In order to have your “voice” heard, you need to communicate your feelings. This is a sensitive topic that is sometimes hard to bring up with physicians, friends, or family members. Fortunately local physicians, care center employees, registered nurses, social workers, parish nurses, and advance care planning facilitators are available in Northfield to help you start the conversation.

IT Tech Corner by Jesse Steed Google Trends

According to [Google Trends](#), the most popular search terms for people in Minnesota in the last 30 days were Minneapolis, Weather, News, Google, Youtube, NFL, Games, Amazon, Reddit, Timberwolves. First of all, we should all pause and reflect on why with all the weather and news apps in the world people are still typing into a Google search the words weather and news. And who is typing Google into a Google search? What are they trying to do? They can't be bothered to type google.com in the address bar? And the same with Youtube. Come on, people! No wonder we need AI. Jeez Louise.

But perhaps more interesting than the overall totals is looking at the search terms that rose the most in popularity over the same time period. One was about the Grammy awards, one was about the cold weather, one was about MLK Day and the other seven in the top ten related to immigration enforcement activities and community responses. Many of these search terms rose by more than 2000% in frequency, mainly because they had never been searched before.

Drilling a bit deeper and closer to home, rising search queries associated with the word "pastor" are nearly entirely related to an infamous individual and church that ruled the news and social media posts recently related to the only thing on everyone's mind.

Trends in Google searches are a reflection of our society at a point in time, but they also reflect our values and say a lot about who we trust to inform us. When I was younger I was often told to "look it up in the encyclopedia Britannica" or "go to the library."

A few questions that come to mind from this brief foray into Google search trends are: What are you searching for? What are you finding?

You will gain an immediate understanding of the challenges facing Palestinians on a daily basis, even the simplest of activities are exponentially more difficult living under occupation and apartheid.

What Can We Do? How can we help those that are suffering?

Everyday choices of US consumers contributed to the downfall of apartheid in South Africa. Since 2005, Palestinians have called on the global community to engage in consumer boycotts. Check out: [No Appetite for Apartheid na4a.org](#)

- Check out this [shoppers guide](#) for a comprehensive list of brands to boycott and alternatives. For example: Do not buy
- Sabra Hummus.
- Use apps, like the [Boycat](#) App to scan barcodes to find out if a product is complicit.
- Check labels: barcodes starting with 729 indicate products made by companies based in Israel.

Boycott HP: HP-branded corporations play key roles in Israel's oppression of Palestinians. They are complicit in Israel's occupation, settler colonial, and apartheid regime. They provide computer hardware to the Israeli army and maintain data centers through their servers for the Israeli police. They provide the Itanium servers to operate the Aviv System, the computerized database of Israel's Population and Immigration Authority. This forms the backbone of Israel's racial segregation and apartheid. Boycott of all HP consumer products, including laptops, printers, and printer ink.

Closing Prayer: Holy God, we worship your name whenever we use our bodies and voices to support the most vulnerable. Lord, illuminate to us where we can bear witness in our lives through creative resistance, and continue to cultivate in us hope and courage to dismantle all structures of oppression.

Northfield United Women in Faith is hosting a gathering of women from the southeastern Minnesota area on April 18, 2026, 8:30-2:00. We will be coming together to learn more about food insecurity and climate change, and sharing fundraising ideas for UWFaith missions.

“Everyone deserves to eat! (source Second Harvest Heartland website) At Second Harvest Heartland, we believe accessing food should be free from anxiety and fear. Working together we all make it easier for our neighbors to reach out when they need help. There is more than enough food for everyone. Every day we are working together to source and distribute food efficiently, advocate for effective policies and programs, and invest in new ways to end hunger in the heartland. Second Harvest Heartland is making sure everyone can eat by providing emergency food boxes. Each box feeds a family of four and includes items like pasta, rice, beans, canned tuna, baking mix, and cooking oil. This is along with boxes for seniors and the regular food shelf activities.

1 in 5 Minnesota households cannot afford the food they need.

Unfortunately, hunger can be found in every county and every population in Minnesota. This includes:

453,000 Minnesotans participate in SNAP

17% of households in Minnesota with at least one senior are food insecure

26% of households in Minnesota with children struggled with food insecurity

Farmers can be a part of **The Good Acre** nonprofit food hub. The Good Acre strengthens connections between farmers and food shelves through purchasing good food directly from farmers. The farmers get a three year contract for their produce such as potatoes, onions, apples, and vegetables. This helps the farmers and the community.

Second Harvest Heartland accepts food donations from local organizations in truck load quantities. If a retailer, a truck driver, a manufacturer has excess food, they can contact Second Harvest Heartland who will distribute it to those needing it and will not send it to a landfill. They have two clean rooms to repack items into smaller packages for food shelves and families in need. Join us to help and find out more.

Final Treasurer's Report for December 2025

General Fund

The CRB checking account balance at the end of December was \$31,976.59 compared to the November balance of \$42,818.97; shows a monthly decrease of \$10,842.38 primarily due to paying of year-end expenses. All 2025 conference apportionments have been paid in full.

Monthly Offering Income for December was \$50,182.03. YTD Actual Offering Income was \$336,167.77 which is \$11,167.77 more than YTD Budget of \$325,000.00. Other Income Totals of \$2,609.50 for December came from Interest Income, Super Wednesday Meal Proceeds, and Facility Usage. General Fund Income Total for December was \$52,791.53. Thus, General Fund YTD Actual Income was \$359,153.24; \$9,593.24 more than the YTD Budget of \$349,560.00.

Monthly Expenses for December totaled \$58,263.81. YTD Actual Expense Totals were \$444,638.74; \$14,220.73 less than the YTD Budget of \$459,859.47. YTD expenses exceed income by \$85,485.50 which is \$14,813.97, less than the YTD Budget shortfall of \$100,299.47.

Physical Plant

Monthly income (Support from General Fund) for December was \$11,122.51. YTD Actual Income was \$186,800.43; \$131,166.46 from General Fund Support for Physical Plant, \$5,335.00 from continuing contributions to the Building Fund, \$1,081.79 from Other Building Contributions, and \$49,217.18 from the Building Maintenance Endowment fund.

YTD Actual Expenses were \$165,753.82 which leaves a positive balance of \$21,046.61. Total YTD insurance costs were \$33,089.18. Significant insurance payments totaling \$16,606.51 were paid in June; \$11,399.08 to Lamb Insurance Services for annual excess wind and hail coverage and \$5,207.43 to Church Mutual for initial 3 months of church and parsonage coverage. The material and outside labor cost of the cabinet upgrades to the parsonage kitchen, dining room and main floor bathroom during February and March totaled \$15,326.80; donated labor totaled 300 hours.

Endowment Funds

At the beginning of January 2025, the total value of the four endowment funds was \$742,577.34. In February \$199,046.17 from the Jim Finholt Estate was deposited into the Undesignated Fund. In February \$18,000 was withdrawn from the Building Maintenance Fund to help pay planned expenses associated with the cabinet upgrades at the parsonage. In May \$11,000.00 was withdrawn from the Building Maintenance Fund to help pay for annual gap (excess wind and hail) insurance. In May, 3% of the April balances in the Sather Mission, Building Maintenance and Undesignated Funds, a total of \$24,885.79, was withdrawn. In September, 3% of the August balances in those same three funds, a total of \$25,889.50, was also withdrawn. The YTD Balance at the end of December (including market value fluctuations, fees and withdrawals) was \$968,840.34 which shows a monthly gain of \$4,141.00 and a YTD gain of \$226,263.00.




